INFORMATION FOR PARENTS OF YEARS 11 AND 12 STUDENTS

I would expect to find all Year 11 and 12 students in their timetabled classes or else involved in study in the library study area. If there is a need to leave the school, it should be in consultation with the Principal.

Please read the Assessment Guidelines. All assessments are compulsory and deadlines are fixed. If there is a substantial problem the student will need a medical certificate or other independent evidence. The Principal will decide what to do to be fair to all of the class if a problem arises.

Part time work should be controlled to ensure it does not impact on school. 8-10 hours per week is OK when not close to exam periods. Then it should be less or none.

Planning is vital to be successful in the HSC. Parents can help by encouraging a planning calendar in a public place at home to record key events. The fridge door is a great place.

Serious HSC students use school holiday periods as study times. This needs to begin from Term 4 in Year 11. Top results are only achieved through intensive study, no matter how clever the person is. Of course a planned break can be helpful and healthy as well.

Senior students are role models for younger students. They need to act, dress and communicate appropriately.

GOSS FROM THE BOSS...

Mulwaree High School's achievements continue to impress at local, regional, state and national levels. At the local level our Cross Country team once again, took out the Zone Cross Country Championship with further success in Swimming and Athletics. Individual achievements include Laura Gray of Year 12 who has

been selected in the Australian Futures Hockey Team; Kelly Rowlings of Year 8, (who I am sure will continue to be mentioned into the future), is a member of the U15 State Cricket Team and is the Vice Captain of the Regional Open Women's Cricket side; Shaun Burke of Year 9 has travelled to China with the Australian Academy U15 Soccer Team and Michael Hoskings has been chosen in the Regional Cricket side; Hope Cohen continues to excel at Golf and one of our student leaders; Our boys open relay team made the top 10 at the CHS finals as did Mitchell Lieschke in the Decathlon a very demanding event.

The 2013 HSC results were as good as ever with 7 students gaining ATARs above 90 with further successes in individual subjects. Ceilidh Newbury was selected for NIDA, Brittany James had her major Textiles and Design work selected as one of the thirty in NSW for inclusion in TexStyle and had her work exhibited in InTech in the same manner.

Our students have certainly excelled and been recognised with an array of awards. Eloise Matthews, the school captain, received a Regional Award for Excellence in Leadership and Jakub Nabaglo gained a Regional Award for Academic Excellence. Jakub was also recognised as the Goulburn/Mulwaree Young Citizen of the Year, represented Goulburn and Australia at the International Science School in Heidelberg, Germany and is the recipient of the ANU's Tuckwell Scholarship. This is a highly competitive scholarship which will support Jakub at university. Jarrod Twaddell, our Vice Captain, received the Pierre de Coubertin award from the International Olympic Committee for his commitment to sport, sportsmanship and school. In other areas, the Dance ensemble participated in the Illawarra Dance Festival and were, once again, the hit of the show.

We have catered very successfully for our academic students through ongoing programs such as our Achievement and Leadership classes in Year 7 and our University linkage programs in conjunction with ANU, Canberra University and The Australian

Catholic University. All vital to providing a variety of pathways for our students as they contemplate their future.

Our upgrades and building program have finally been completed (for the time being). The COLA has become indispensable when weather is taken into account and the Industrial Kitchen, Cafe and second kitchen are all brand new. This has been a \$1.4 million project which provides the staff and students with the quality facilities that they deserve. Our focus for 2014 in this area will be the Wetlands project where a combination of grants from the P&C, Veolia and Council will see a walkway and teaching area developed at the school. This will be for the teaching of biodiversity and environmental education which will support students from Mulwaree and our partner primary schools.

Once again we will have a number of staff changes and additions. Cassie Christie in English and Jeremy McMahon and Lalaja Srmbikal in Maths have taken up permanent positions at Mulwaree. We welcome Mrs Sally Curry as the Head Teacher PD/H/PE, replacing Mr Russell Lieschke who has taken up the Deputy Principal's position. We will also welcome Ms Penny Ackery as the new Head Teacher for Support and Ms Niri Hilary, Support Teacher who will join Mr Paranthoene and Ms Naper in the new Support unit. This is a welcome addition to our school and I look forward to working with them and the Support Officers, Tim Dally, Jenny Saw and Tanya Klowers as they set up this unit. We will farewell Mr Davis and Mr Auhl to retirement a sad day for Mulwaree but new opportunities for other teachers. I would like to wish them all the very best in their retirement, and thank them for their sterling service to Mulwaree and Public Education. Ms Nance will be the Relieving English Head Teacher in 2014. My thanks to the teaching and non teaching staff at Mulwaree, they are hard working and tireless in their support of students and themselves.

To the Executive of the school, I would like to thank them for their support and professional approach to their jobs. Finally to Mr Wardle, Mr Lieschke and Mr Meader for their support as the Deputy Principals, their hard work and differing perspectives ensure that the school maintains high standards of education, welfare and discipline.

I would like to wish our students, staff and parents a wonderful Christmas and enjoyable New Year. 2014 will continue to see Mulwaree maintain its excellent position in Goulburn.

EXPECTATIONS AT MULWAREE

Bullying and harassment can take place anywhere in the community as well as at school. It is not acceptable. Let the bully know you want it to stop. If that does not work, get help from staff.

Leave a contact number and information about the subject matter and we will get back to you to arrange an appointment.

Rewards. We will continue to reward good work through the Endeavour Award Scheme where teachers will give out "green tickets" for achievements in Academic, Sporting, Culture and School Service. The tickets generate the right to special excursions and prize draws as well as Bronze, Silver, Gold and Platinum Awards.

Use of inappropriate language. It has absolutely no place in the classroom or in the playground.

Every student is expected to show commitment and diligence in class and complete all tasks to the best of their ability

- If absences occur please send a note (or Mulwaree's own absence note) of explanation on the return day.

Student Use of Mobile Phones

With the increasing misuse of mobile phones within the school it has become necessary to change the school's policy. Some examples of misuse and time lost in terms of Teaching and Learning are as follows:-

- Students using phones to "set up" fights and to video these incidents. These are then placed on Facebook and You tube.
- The impact this has on the school image and students' self esteem.
- No guarantee of student safety with people outside of school "invited" to attend and witness or involve themselves in these fights.
- Loss of teaching time dealing with phone issues in class or related to lost and stolen phones.
- Cyberbullying and time spent trying to sort out issues at school.
- Photographing of other students without approval.
- Exam malpractice.

- Students are NOT to bring mobile phones to school.
- Mobile phones on excursion and sporting visits will be at the discretion of the organiser.

The photo of 'ballet' style shoes (pictured on the next page) indicates the current fashion trend. Unfortunately, they fall short of Work Health and Safety standards and are not permitted at school. The other fashion that was more prevalent among boys is the canvas slip on or even lace up shoes. All students should be wearing firm shoes with complete leather upper and tongue. Lace up shoes are preferred. For any family who cannot provide their own, I will be happy to provide these for you. All you need to do is request student assistance.

Please do not accept advice to the contrary about what is acceptable from a shop assistant or your children. "They are all wearing them," is a well worn but untrue line from students.

Shoes that comply with WH&S regulations are able to be purchased at a lower cost than fashion shoes. There are fashionable shoes that also comply, but you can expect to pay more.

A recent trend in the community is the use of body piercings. They are an WH&S risk if uncovered. My preference is that they do not have them at all. Where they are exposed, I would expect them to be covered with a band-aid. I am happy to supply band-aids. Please prohibit or discourage your children from getting any new piercings until they leave school. Then it can be an issue for the employer.

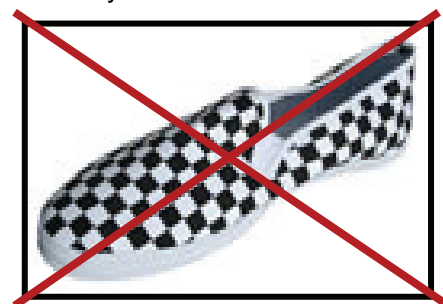

The pictured shoes are **INCORRECT** footwear and must **NOT** be worn to school. These style of shoes are not covered by WH&S.

PLEASE HELP BY ENSURING SHOES ARE SUITABLE

Footwear should have a full black leather upper (including the tongue) and have no man-made materials, such as nylon. *All students* (boys and girls) wear black leather school shoes. School shoes should be fairly firm and water resistant. The laces should also be black.

These shoes will be necessary for students to take part in practical subjects where materials (hot, corrosive, sharp or heavy) might fall on their feet.

Of course, students will need a change of shoes for sport and PE.

English History

Some facts about English

English is the only compulsory subject in high school in New South Wales.

English is the only subject that is attempted in some form by every student in the school.

Students in the English/History faculty have enjoyed a productive year. Our H.S.C students from 2012 achieved credible results, which reflect their commitment and that of their teachers. We look forward to the results of this year's H.S.C groups, knowing that they have shown a similar level of commitment and application. We continue to provide H.S.C student with opportunities to extend their understanding through experiences, such as the Ancient History Incursion and the excursion to Sydney to view a performance of 'The Shoehorn Sonata'. Junior students have not been neglected with opportunities for wider experience with a variety of opportunities. The Bell Shakespeare bus filled very quickly as students embraced these opportunities.



History students in Year 9 and 10 had a dramatic change of programme in 2013. As part of their studies of WWI students in Year 9 each spent a significant period of time with Mr Bill Needham, a former HT Science, explaining the resources of the War Memorial Library.



This gave them insight into the value of the library, but also an insight into WWI and the individual contributions of Goulburn citizens to the War. In some cases, these people were distant relatives.



Every Year 10 History student has a compulsory decade study, where they explore the social history of the time period, under Mrs Doyle's guidance. This year's group had the opportunity to experience aspects of life in the '60s: the music, the fashion, the sports and entertainments. Students engaged in a variety of activities; skipping, hoola hoops, pogo sticks, and egg and spoon races. The teachers entered into the spirit with their costuming. It was a wonderful chance to dress up and have fun. It really brought the '60s alive for the students.



Senior students had many occasions for wider exploration of their subject in History. Ancient History students

undertook two excursions across the year, one, to the Nicolson Museum, to extend their understanding of the ancient world and the second to the Alexander exhibition at the Australian Museum

The core work of English teachers lies in the areas of Reading, Writing and Speaking. And this tradition has continued. In Year 7, students participated in the RIBIT programme, an opportunity to engage in wide reading of their own choice. Students across the year embraced this both for the simple pleasure of reading and as a way of developing and extending their own language.





While we actively teach writing skills in all classes, through Mrs Doyle's writing group, we encourage students to participate in writing for their own pleasure and purpose. This has been ably supported by the Prefects who assist by providing juice and milo. Across the year this small but enthusiastic group has continued to meet fortnightly to share their writing experiences. Speaking is a core area of English as a subject and we have always had a dedicated band of students with talent and flair for this at MHS. Jakub Nabaglo, this year, reached the Regional Final of the Lions Youth of the Year, a competition that requires students to participate in an interview about the world and their perspectives on this, and to present a prepared and an impromptu speech to an audience of Lions' members and their guests. Jakub was also chosen by the local Council to speak at the Goulburn 150th Celebrations. Jakub, Grace Devery, Alicia and Michaela Judge also ably represented MHS at the annual Rostrum Public Speaking Competition



Our debating groups continue to prosper through their participation in State debating competitions. While for many the idea of engaging in such an activity would be crippling, this steady band continue to step up to the challenge. In Year 10 Courtney Flack, Agata Nabaglo, Grace Devery & Philip Mills represented the school. In Year 7/8, Loreнна Caron, Amy Canty, Emma Adrain, Lucinda Leten, Sarah Gilson, Caleb Thomas, and Anna Wheatley participated in the competition. The group of Loreнна, Amy, Caleb and Anna were District Champions and came third in the Regional Final out of 32 teams



It may surprise many to learn that for many years, Viewing and Representing has been a part of English. This requires students to understand that ideas can be represented visually in film, photo, collage, PowerPoint or on a webpage. With these our students continued to excel in their imagination, creativity and sophistication. Accompanying this report are some photos from some of Ms Wilson's students.

The English-History Staff wish to congratulate all students for their efforts and participation across the year. We look



forward to an even better year in 2014.



The Year in Science

Jakub Nabaglo - In 2013 Jakub was selected for the International Youth Science Forum in Heidelberg, Germany. Jakub was one of approximately 20 Australian students who were selected to further develop and explore Science skills and future careers. He has also been selected for the prestigious Tuckwell scholarship at ANU for 2014. This scholarship is the equivalent of \$20,000 per year and is dependent on Jakub obtaining very high ATAR scores. Fingers crossed – however to get to this level is a real achievement as no other student in Goulburn has been selected for this scholarship and only very few students Australia wide are successful. Jakub is a great example of what can be achieved at Mulwaree High School, Goulburn.

Brittany Lewis is a Year 12 student who studies both Chemistry and Biology. She has been awarded the Victor Chang Award for outstanding effort and achievement in Science. The Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute is one of Australia's premier research organisations. This award encourages and supports interest and future careers in Science that require high levels of achievement, creativity and hard work. Brittany is well deserving of this award.

Lachlan Granger - Lachlan is a Year 10 Ag student has come second in a professional quick shearing competition in Crookwell. Lachlan is an outstanding Ag student and is a great example of student participation and achievement in Agriculture.

Honeywell's Summer School of Engineering

Every year, Year 11 students are selected across the state to participate in a Summer school or week of Engineering at Macquarie University. Students must meet certain

academic criteria to participate in this activity, which aims to give students a taste of University life and a possible career in Science. This year Luke Holmes and Margaret Sale will represent Mulwaree High School and will later use this experience to extend their knowledge and also share with their fellow Physics and Chemistry classmates.

Wetlands Project

During 2013 Dr Devery and the P & C have been busy obtaining funding for significant

improvements in the school wetland area. The photo shows Mr Tom Appel and Dr Devery receiving \$19,850 from the Veolia Mulwaree Trust for this project. This is to provide walkways and water sampling stations on the school dams or ponds and will provide educational skills and a resource to students at our school and feeder primary schools. Part of this project involves the planting of trees and shrubs through the wetland area. In preparation for this project, Year 12 Construction students have provided new work benches or stations for future horticulture projects.

2013-14 Projects

1. Sustainability, as a key learning area, is an important component in the new Australian

Curriculum. As part of a drive to improve resources to study the environment, students have been involved in the following projects. Year 12 Construction students have worked with the Ag

faculty and the Environment committee to

improve the work spaces in the school green house. These work benches have design features to allow the easy watering and storage of seedlings or cuttings which will be used in the wetlands and other school projects. 2. An upgrade of piezometers to collect information regarding ground water flows under the school will occur. Piezometers are something like wells or bores that are connected to underground water stores or aquifers. The water in these aquifers can move or flow into rivers or dams. Our school has 2 piezometers which is an unusual resource for a school and have been recently fitted with data loggers to measure this movement. It is part of a research project and collaboration with the Science faculty and Sydney Uni. The photo show Prof ver Voort and his PhD student setting up data loggers in the school wetland area.



3. Upgrade of Michael Wharton Grove by Year 9/10 Environmental science students. As any person living in Goulburn knows water is an important resource not to be wasted. This year the students and teacher Ms Heath, constructed a rain water garden to recycle storm water run-off into gardens as part of Goulburn Mulwaree Council water week competition. The school was successful in this competition and have used the prize money to provide bird baths in the Michael Wharton Grove area - birds have been sighted using these baths. This all helps increase the biodiversity and environmental resources at our school. The photo shows the bird bath and bird box at school. The bird boxes were built the previous year in the 9/10 Environmental Science class and this year have been modified and installed as part of ongoing projects on the school environment. The photo shows 2014 9/10 Environmental Science students Kyle Edwards and Joshua Grummer who assisted in the installation of bird boxes.



Students have also been involved in drawing and identifying the local plants at Mulwaree High School. The picture represents a specimen of eucalypt leaf and a banksia plant drawn by Sarah Steele in the Year 10 Science Transition group. This will develop into booklets and worksheets for the Wetlands Project.



Future Projects

Ag Club - Coming in 2014!!! Students with an interest in Agriculture, even those who do not study the subject in school, are being given the chance to join an Ag Club in 2014. Students will work with the Agriculture teachers on a range of exciting projects covering all areas of Agriculture, including animal production, plant production and horticulture and continuing the improvements on the school farm.



ANU Workshops 2013 Science students have benefited from free workshops provided by ANU to support and encourage engagement in Science. During term 4, a Marine Science workshop discussed the biology of whales and sea grasses as well as careers in Science. The photo shows Jacob Howe thanking the ANU staff for their presentation.

From the Mathematics Faculty

As always, it's been a busy year in the Mathematics faculty. At the beginning of the year we welcomed Mr McMahon and Ms Srmbikal to the faculty.

The Board of Studies approved new syllabuses for implementation in 2013 for General Mathematics – with little time to prepare we have been working on getting this new syllabus in place. We have also spent a good number of hours preparing for the Australian Curriculum in 2014, writing programs for Years 7 and 9. In addition, Mr Coward has invested some of his time into developing some project based learning exercises in preparation for next year's Year 7 Learning class.



In July we welcomed The World of Maths to the school. Students from Years 7 and 8 spent a morning solving problems that related Mathematics to their everyday life. The participants really enjoyed it and we hope to have them back in 2014.



A large number of students entered the Australian Mathematics Competition – Owen Perkins achieved a Distinction and another nine students achieved Credits. Two students, Jacob Howe and Catherine Gerges also entered the Maths Challenge for Young Australians, the next level up from the Maths Competition. Both received a credit in this selective competition.

In addition to teaching mathematics, two of our faculty staff have extended their skills into computing. Mr Kodakalla taught Year 9 Information and Software

Technology this year and will continue this into Year 10 next year. Ms Soondra introduced the Stage 6 course in Software Design and Development in Year 11 this year for the first time at Mulwaree. She will continue the course into Year 12 in 2014. She is also preparing for the next group of Year 11 students.

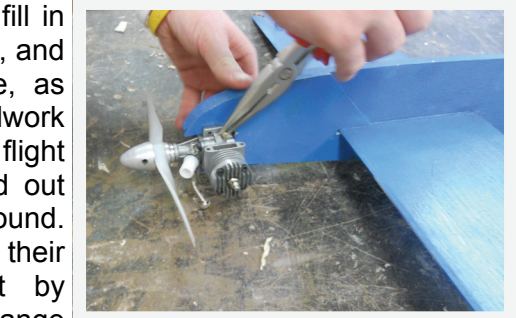

Industrial Arts Faculty

It's been another hectic year down in D Block, as the interest in this subject area continues to grow. Not only was there plenty of enthusiasm, their imaginations ran wild as well. Mr Dorman's kids went crazy with the grinders and welders, but most of all, the plasma cutter was off the chain. Mr Earl's seniors produced some great results in the woodwork room, especially Jason Broadbent who received a letter of nomination for his major design project. What an eventful and exciting year it has been in the HSIE faculty. Ms Gorman returned from maternity leave as head teacher and we welcomed two more dedicated teachers to the team, Mr K Tuovinen and Ms H McIntosh.

AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM

We have been busy preparing programs and resources for the new K-10 History syllabus due for implementation in 2014. Year 7 students will now investigate the ancient past, including that of Australia and China. HSIE are very eager to begin working with the new syllabus and program next year and are very fortunate to be able to incorporate the archaeological expertise of Mr Tuovinen.

LITERACY

HSIE teachers have been focussing on the implementation of the Structured Teaching and Responding program in Year 11 and 12, along with the explicit use of SEAL paragraphs in Years 7-10. Students are provided with explicit instruction and scaffolding with the aim of improving their written responses. Staff have been very pleased with the many students that have had success with the STAR and SEAL methods, constructing dynamic paragraphs and extended responses in both class and examination situations.

We look forward to developing our HSIE STAR and SEAL activities to further enhance student achievement in 2014.

2013 also saw the Peer Tutor Program revamped, with a number of Year 7 students and Year 12 Work Studies involved in weekly tutoring sessions. The sessions centred around establishing positive peer relationships, building confidence and increasing subject specific vocabulary and comprehension skills. The program will be evaluated during the 2013/2014 holiday break. The HSIE faculty and Work Studies look forward to again implementing enhanced peer literacy tutoring sessions in 2014.



SCHOOL CONNECT PROGRAM

In 2013 the HSIE faculty sponsored two Indian students through STAR Kids Scholarships and the School Connect Program. Luis Marie and Silvia from Rosary English School in Waitangi received funding raised by Geography students to cover their educational scholarships. MHS provided the students with school polo shirts and they eagerly expressed their gratitude with hand written letters and photos. 2014 will be an exciting time for the School Connect Program as we establish online live connections with Silvia and Luis Marie.

COMPETITIONS & HSIE TRIVIA

A large number of HSIE students participated in the 2013 Australian Geography competition. Many students were successful in receiving merit certificates and are to be congratulated on showing their commitment to Geography.

Term Four saw the introduction of the Mulwaree Trivia Comp, the brainchild of Mr Wolter. Held during lunch each fortnight, students from each year group turned up in droves to partake in the general knowledge challenge. The winning team from each challenge was then entered into the grand finale, which took place in the school hall.

All years and house groups were represented, with strong support from the general school population and many trivia buff teachers! The final critical question, a James Bond clue, had fans racing and minds debating.....however it was Pinyali that came away with the goods. Congratulations to Pinyali who earnt the first engraving on the annual MHS Trivia trophy.

A big thank you to Mr Wolter and his helpers for providing such a fantastic distraction to MHS students.

EXCURSIONS

HSIE students were provided with many opportunities to engage in learning outside of the classroom during 2013.

Commerce students travelled to Sydney to discover the business behind the big smile of Luna Park. Students were taken behind the scenes and given an insight into the daily operations of the historic theme park. Of course many rides were tested by Year 9 and 10 for their suitability!!

Year 10 Geography students embarked on the annual field studies excursion to Lake Illawarra. Stuart and the team at the Illawarra Environmental Centre never fail to disappoint, giving students the opportunity to gather practical fieldwork skills along the Windang/Warilla coastline. Students participating in the fieldwork were then able to apply their coastal management knowledge to classwork and assessments.



As part of their 'Economic Enterprise' study, HSC Geography students were treated to a local excursion at a merino fine wool farm, close to Gunning. Upper Lachlan Shire entrepreneur and Councillor Mr Geoff Shaw enabled the students to get a practical grasp on the historical and current value of the Australian commodity.

Preliminary Geography students were treated to a different experience, visiting the shores of Manly Beach and gathering field data!

GUEST SPEAKERS

Stage 5 Geography students were fortunate to experience a touching and inspiring visit from refugee Alphonso Karbehl. Alphonso and his family relocated to Goulburn after fleeing from their homeland, Liberia. Whilst Alphonso's talk was engaging, many students reported being appreciative of their lifestyle and opportunities in Australia.

In collaboration with the Science faculty, Year 8 students continued the valuable partnership with the Australian National University. A number of students participated in a 'Water Filter' workshop run by Engineers without Borders. Students were required to research, fund and construct a functional water filter, whilst demonstrating global inequalities. A practical and valuable experience had by all!

Preliminary Economics maintained its connection with the talented economist Mr Malcolm Bosworth. 2013 is the second year Malcolm has volunteered to visit MHS and provide his expertise in relation to free trade and the World Trade Organisation. Malcolm's knowledge is highly sought after and in 2014 he will move to Switzerland to consult at Bond University. We hope that Malcolm can visit the HSIE department upon his return!

ALL MY OWN WORK & YR10 TRANSITION

2013 saw the continuation of All My Own Work monitored by the HSIE faculty. All My Own Work is a compulsory package designed by the NSW Board of Studies, which all students are required to complete before returning for the Preliminary year. The package comprises 5 modules which students are required to complete with a 90% average.

Mr Rodgers is pleased to announce that ALL students in Yr10 have satisfied the requirements for All My Own Work!

Upon completion of All My Own Work, Year 10 students began preparing for their Preliminary studies. In collaboration with the English/History faculty, students were given a choice of transition program based on their electives for 2014. Geography, Legal Studies, Business Studies and Economics classes were strongly represented with students gaining valuable background knowledge prior to the start of their Preliminary year. The HSIE faculty would like to congratulate Year 10 students for their mature and determined approach to the 2013 Transition program.



Overall 2013 has been a busy and productive year in the HSIE faculty. We would like to take the opportunity to thank and farewell an experienced staff member in Mr Geoff McMahon. Staff would also like to thank students, parents and the community for their commitment, their enthusiasm and their humour throughout the year.

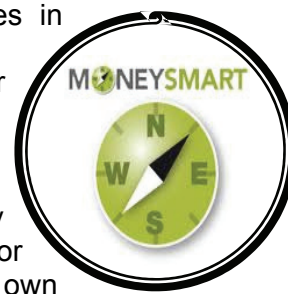

Drama students from Years 9, 10 and 11 performed plays which were studied this year to appreciative parents and friends.

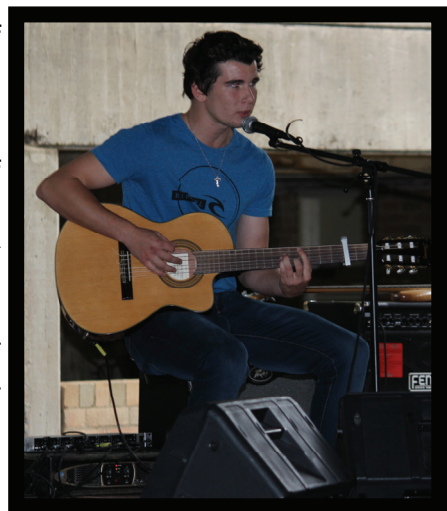
These audiences were able to appreciate the array of tasks involved in this subject apart from the acting, including lighting, directing and back stage work.

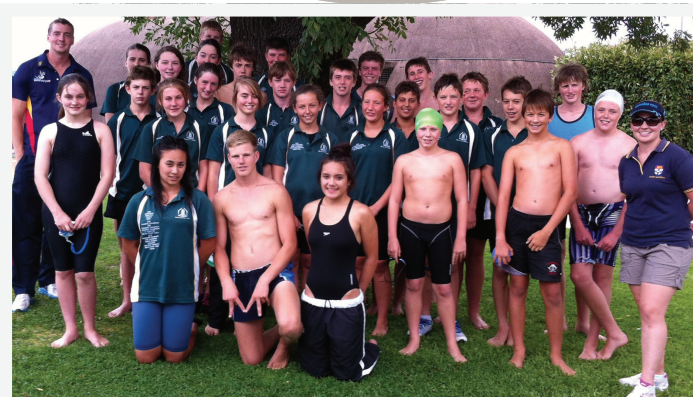

Heidelberg

One of year 12's best science students, Jakub Nabaglo, had the opportunity of a lifetime this July when, as one of only three in Australia, he was selected to attend the International Summer Science School Heidelberg in the scientific capital of Germany. Over a three-week internship at the prestigious Heidelberg Institute for Theoretical Studies, a scientific institute with offices and computers, but no labs, he studied the field of molecular biomechanics, which involves investigating the effects of forces on protein by simulating them on supercomputers. 'The experience allowed me to witness the latest advancements in science. It was fascinating to learn from world-class scientists who spend every day expanding our knowledge of the world around us,' said Jakub, who also got the chance to explore the history and culture of the city of Heidelberg and its region, as well

as made friends from all around the world.

Jakub was also offered a Tuckwell Scholarship, worth \$100 000 over five years, at the Australian National University, where he hopes to study computer science starting next year.





Language in 2013

Throughout the year of 2013, teachers and students from the Language Department have shared lots of happiness and success. In June, with Mr Wardle's ongoing coordination, Year 8, 9 and 10 language students had a Language Immersion Day with 15 ANU students with Chinese and Indonesian background. 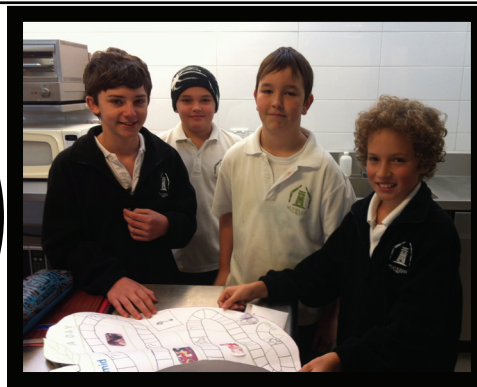

What been happening in Technology & Applies Studies?

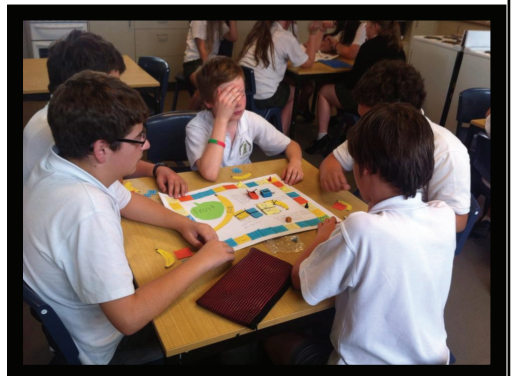
Year 7 and 8 Technology

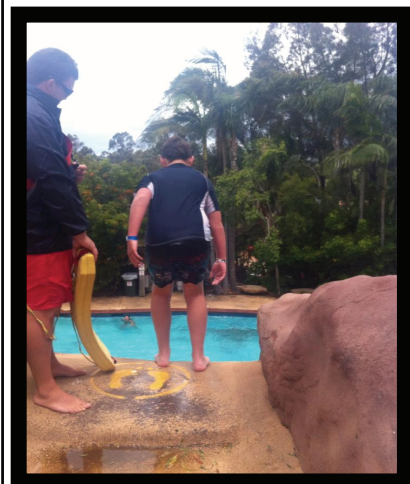

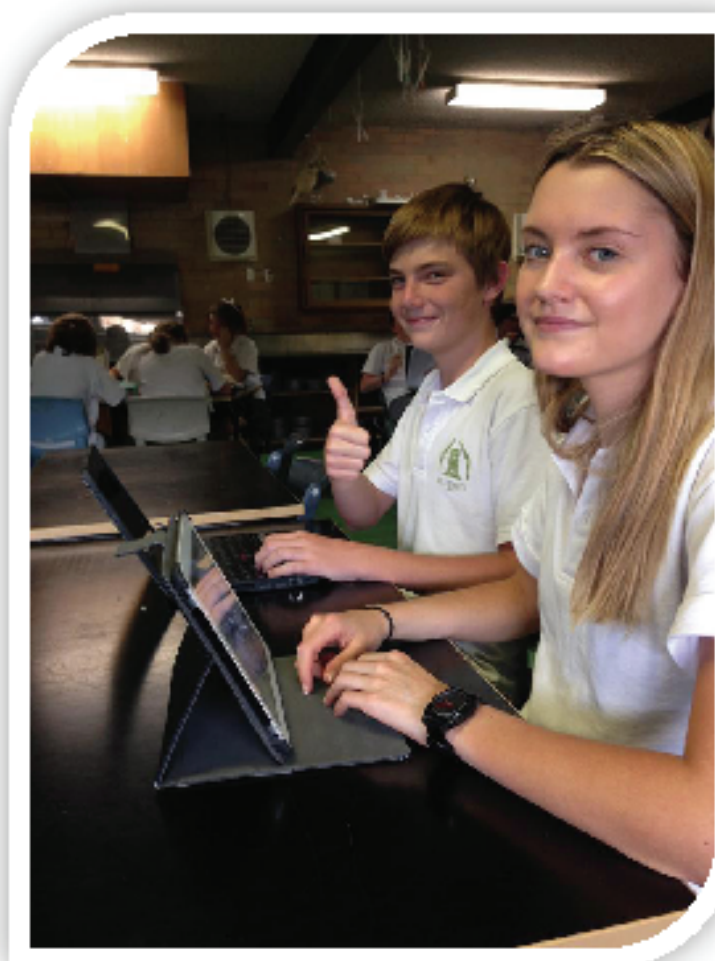
A year 7 trial class will run next year starting from Term 1 week 5, and a full school rollout of the program is expected to start in Term 3 2014.

Students who bring their own device to school will be required to sign and abide by a user agreement, similar to the one currently in place for students with DER laptops.
